Member Biographies

Roderick Bremby (Co-chair)

Commissioner

Department of Social Services

Roderick L. Bremby was appointed by Governor Dannel P. Malloy as Commissioner of the Department of Social Services (DSS) in March 2011. Commissioner Bremby joined Connecticut state government after an extensive public-sector career in Kansas and Texas, and academic service at the University of Kansas.

From 2003 to 2010, Commissioner Bremby served as the Secretary (chief executive officer) of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, that state's combined public health and environmental protection agency. Appointed by Governor Kathleen Sebelius, he led programs dedicated to providing disease surveillance and prevention efforts, bioterrorism planning guidance, local and rural health assistance, health care and environmental information, and statewide health promotional campaigns. In addition, he oversaw the regulation of public and environmental health functions, including child care centers, hospitals and medical facilities, laboratories, food service, establishments, landfills, confined animal feeding operations, and construction and operating permits for all companies with the potential to pollute the environment.

From 2000 to 2003, Commissioner Bremby served as an Assistant Research Professor at the University of Kansas, where he also served as Associate Director of the university's Work Group on Health Promotion and Community Development, and coordinated the launch of the Institute for Community Health and Development.

At the municipal government level, Commissioner Bremby was Assistant City Manager of Lawrence, Kansas, from 1990 to 2000, serving as chief operating officer responsible for police, fire and medical, public works, water and sewer, parks and recreation, finance, information systems, airport management, and budget preparation functions. The Commissioner's municipal experience also includes four years as an Assistant to the City Manager in Fort Worth, Texas.

During his first three years at the Connecticut Department of Social Services, Commissioner Bremby has directed initiatives in such areas as health care program restructuring, modernization of technology and business processes for improved client service delivery, and implementation of budget and legislative program changes. The Commissioner has worked with the Governor's Office, Office of Policy and Management and Department of Administrative Services' Bureau of Enterprise Systems and Technology to target reinvestment in the agency's staffing and technology infrastructure during a time of increased applications and caseloads.

Mark Raymond (Co-chair)

CIO

Bureau of Enterprise Systems Technology

Mr. Raymond began serving as the Chief Information Officer for the State of Connecticut, Department of Administrative Services, Bureau of Enterprise Systems and Technology on June 2, 2011. In this role, Mr. Raymond has broad responsibilities for technology within state.

He has over twenty-five years of technology and business experience. Prior to joining the State, he consulted in New York, Connecticut, and Massachusetts in the areas of finance, payroll, human resources, budgeting, procurement, human services, revenue, and transportation. His specialties are shared services, administrative systems and technical infrastructure.

Dr. Anne Camp, MD

Fair Haven Community Health Center*

Dr. Camp serves as the Director of the Diabetes and Diabetes Prevention Program at the Fair Haven Community Health Center, a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) in New Haven. She brings over two decades of direct patient care in both internal medicine and endocrinology as well as extensive experience implementing system changes to improve care in diabetes and other chronic conditions in low income populations. Dr. Camp has served as leadership for many national and state-wide multi-year initiatives through the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) as part of the Health Disparities Collaborative to improve chronic disease care and cancer prevention for underserved groups. As part of the HRSA Clinical Advisory Group, she helped develop a national patient electronic registry for clinical management and reporting of multiple chronic conditions and preventive care which was used by FQHCs across the country. Dr. Camp has served on the Physician Advisory Group for the Yale Epic EMR implementation, and currently co-chairs the Yale New Haven Health System Clinical Integration Epic Disease Management (Registry) Planning workgroup.

Dr. Patricia Checko

Dr. Checko has 50 years' experience in public health and public health policy at the state and local level. During her years at the Department of Public Health (DPH), Dr. Checko oversaw the infectious disease program registries, reporting systems, and was an end user of the state's HIT. She created behavioral risk factor surveys and analyzed results with specific attention to equity and disparity issues. As an end user, Dr. Checko is able to identify the data necessary to evaluate impact. Currently, she serves as the Co-chairman of the SIM Consumer Advisory Board as well as the Central Connecticut Board of Health, the CT Cancer Partnership, the MATCH Coalition (Mobilize Against Tobacco for Connecticut's Health) and the CT Tobacco and Health Trust Fund Board of Trustees.

In her current role at the Department of Mental Health & Addiction Services (DMHAS), Ms. DeFlumer-Trapp oversees projects related to healthcare reform initiatives including financing and health information technology innovations, leads departmental initiatives related to behavioral health mobile technology research and program development, and serves as the Implementation Team Manager for the DMHAS Electronic Health Record. Previously, Ms. DeFlumer-Trapp led Sound Community Services, a behavioral health outpatient provider, as the Director of Information Technology, and worked as a clinical implementation SME through two behavioral health EHR implementations. She has consulting experience with behavioral health providers in various states with a focus in clinical implementation and the development of clinical workflows. She has 10 years' experience with multiple HIT platforms including Credible Behavioral Health Enterprise Software, Carelogic Enterprise Software, and Web Infrastructure for Treatment Services (WITS), and has predominantly worked with mental health and addiction providers and populations.

At the Connecticut Hospital Association (CHA), Dr. Dias provides insight and support for the CHA initiatives in advocacy, quality and patient safety, regulatory and reimbursement issues, community health and disparities, and the use of data to drive clinical performance. Dr. Dias directs CHA's Data Services team, overseeing ChimeData, a database that contains more than 31 million patient encounters dating back to 1980. Dr. Dias has robust data analytics experience with a focus on knowledge transformation, improving patient safety and quality, and reducing costs. Prior to joining CHA, Dr. Dias was the Managing Director of Innovation & Research at Blue Health Intelligence (BHI) and served in that role at the Blue Cross Blue Shield Association. Prior to BHI, Dr. Dias worked at Blue Cross Blue Shield of Massachusetts, where he focused on integrating performance reporting, operational improvement opportunities to mitigate cost, and quality initiatives in behavioral health. He has directed operational management at a community health center, consulted for mental health initiatives, and worked as a psychiatric crisis clinician. Previously, Dr. Dias worked as a clinic founder and general practitioner physician in India.

As Vice President of Program at the Connecticut Health Foundation, Ms. Donelson sets the Foundation's programmatic strategy, which includes grant making, the health leadership fellows program, and evaluation. With her team members, Ms. Donelson determines how to bring issues to light to influence and advocate for health equity on behalf of the underserved and populations of color in Connecticut. Prior to working with the Connecticut Health Foundation, Ms. Donelson held several leadership roles within different business units at Aetna, Inc., the most recent of which was the deputy chief of staff for Aetna's National Businesses Office, a segment of Aetna that comprised nine businesses within the organization. At Aetna, Tiffany also held the role of Director of Strategic Initiatives for an Aetna business line. In the role, she responsible for the successful execution of all projects and initiatives, including managing an Information Technology project to migrate the segment's claims and processing system to a new platform to assure compliance with Health Care Reform ICD-10 regulations. Dr. Hunt is currently the CPHO of St. Vincent's Health Partners, a Physician-Hospital Organization (PHO) that actively manages patients in both commercial and public payment models. Additionally, Dr. Hunt is the CMIO of St. Vincent's Health Services. St. Vincent's Health Services recently implemented Cerner's OneChart and the Ministry is optimizing the EMR while investigating how to use other tools interoperatively (including Optum and Senti7). There, Dr. Hunt works to unite the clinical and technological needs currently available to the network, participate with strategic planning to meet the changing requirements for delivery care models, and allow successful participation in joint ventures. St. Vincent's is recognized as a leader using data successfully to improve the health of patient populations while meeting payer quality and utilization expectation. Dr. Hunt has also worked as a physician informaticist and CMIO for 7 years, during which he implemented an EMR in 29 hospitals and in more than 300 offices. He has worked with decision support, reporting, information portability, portals, telehealth, peripherals, and mobile devices, among other HIT areas. Dr. Hunt has both clinical and administrative functionality experience. Dr. Hunt is both a user of technology, as a clinically active pediatrician, and an IT specialist. Matthew Katz

In his role at the Connecticut State Medical Society (CSMS), Mr. Katz interacts with more than 6,000 physicians and physicians in training as they engage in the evaluation, adoption, and implementation of health information technology. CSMS has engaged in activities of product review, product evaluation, and product recommendation with their membership and practices. As a founding member of EHealth Connecticut, CSMS is involved in a number of health information technology programs at the state and national level. CSMS has also surveyed their membership on HIT use and adoption and worked with national organizations, including CMS, to explore how meaningful use requirements can be improved.

Through this experience, Mr. Katz gained insight into the “dos and don’ts” of product selection and experienced both workflow correction and practice deterioration tied to HIT adoption. Outside of his work at CSMS, Mr. Katz chairs a subcommittee of the Physicians Advocacy Institute where he helped design a practice management resource tool for physician practices that is used by thousands of physicians nationwide. He is Chair of the American Association of Medical Society Executives State CEO Committee that focuses on practice management and related resources for physician and medical societies. In addition, Mr. Katz is a member of the Connecticut Chapter of the Medical Group Management Association, the Connecticut All Payer Claims Database (Access Health) committee, the Complex Care Committee of the Council on Medical Assistance Program Oversight, the Access Health CT Small Business Health Options Program (SHOP) Committee, and an Advisory Board member of the Comparative Effectiveness Public Advisory Council (CEPAC). Mr. Katz was recently published in peer reviewed literature tied to issues of workforce data, health equity data, and patient centered medical home (PCMH) development and implementation. Previously, Mr. Katz ran the American Medical Association (AMA) Practice Management Resource Center charged with helping physicians navigate health information technology adoption specific to claims processing and billing. In this role Mr. Katz also worked with staff to evaluate patient and disease registries.

In addition to serving as the Vice President of the Radiological Society of Connecticut, Dr. Kaye is the CEO of Advanced Radiology Consultants (ARC), a 31-physician practice that serves 2 hospital radiology departments and 7 outpatient imaging centers. ARC has been an early adopter and promoter of numerous IT enhancements to patient care. They were the first practice to incorporate PACS (Picture Archiving and Communication Software), a remote viewing software for ordering physicians and patients, and radiology specific patient engagement portals. ARC was one of the first two radiology practices in the US to obtain certification for Meaningful Use national initiatives. Additionally, Dr. Kaye is an Officer and Board Member of the American College of Radiology, serving on its IT, Economics, and Government Relations Commissions. He has been Chairman of the Legislative Committee of the Radiological Society of Connecticut for 24 years. Dr. Kaye has 31 years’ experience as a practicing radiologist in Connecticut and previously served as the Chairman of the Department of Radiology at Bridgeport Hospital.

Ms. Skinner developed and is responsible for multiple population based care management programs including PCMH and the care management program for 35,000 lives covered through the YNHHS benefits plan.
